MEMBERSHIP: We have a great opportunity to earn some money for the chapter. National Audubon has received a grant to help build membership and are now running a little contest. To the chapter in each region gaining the most new members between January 1 and June 30 will go \$1000. To the chapter in each region showing the largest percentage increase during this period will go another \$1000. We rank 24 of 25 in our region by numbers as of Jan. 1. If each one can recruit at least one new member during this period, we have a good chance. Also, for those of you already members- please renew those memberships. That is our only source of funds at present.

Programs: Our January program was very popular, with several members presenting some of their favorite slides. Because of the response from those present we will make this an annual feature, so remember this for next year. Future programs are excellent, and we are starting to line up next years.

EMBLEM CONTEST: As a result of the voting at the January meeting, the entry submitted by Ben Hiatt of Tuckerton was the winning entry. Mrs. Hiatt did the art work. Subject is an Osprey landing. This will be on display at the next meeting. We are now looking into having this made up as a membership patch.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS: Full results will appear in American Birds, but here is a brief summary of our local counts.

MARMORA: This was our own count started this year and was quite successful. 22 field observers and 6 feeder watchers took part. Total was 124 species, 52,598 birds. We could use more help.

OCEANVILLE: 16 members of AAS participated. 127 species and 70,818 birds. TUCKERTON: Several members took part in this one also- totals were lower. Although plans for post-count gettogethers fell through at the last minute, we hope to set these up for next year. We would hope to have more participation next year so that all areas could be covered much better.

COUNTY PARK: Atlantic County has purchased land in Estell Manor for a county park. We offered our services to help in planning nature trails and survey plants and wildlife. One visit has been made and recommendations made to the Board of Freeholders. We are pushing for slow careful planning as this area appears to have tremendous potential for nature study, as well as some historical values that should be preserved.

Help is also needed to encourage Galloway Township to preserve the Great Blue Heron Rookery in Pomona and the Great Creek Bog. Their conservation commission is currently looking into these areas. Give them your support.

BEGINNING BIRDING COURSE: In previous years, a brief program has been run at the Brigantine Wildlife Refuge to introduce field identification to those who had not had much experience. This year we are offering an expanded course consisting of six evening sessions and six morning field trips at the Refuge. Because of the additional work involved in the evening sessions, we are asking that each participant donate \$5 to the Atlantic Audubon Society Sanctuary Fund. Since New Jersey Audubon charges \$25 for their course, we feel that this request is reasonable. Pre-registration is required. Donation is to be sent with registration form at bottom of last page.


### WRITE - WRITE - WRITE::::
